Views on News

The Big Tree Debate held at the <u>Garden Museum</u> in June highlighted concerns about city landscapes in the future when many of the mature 'big trees' trees planted in urban areas - some being over 200 year sold - will reach the end of their lives. Of particular concern is the fact that local authorities are choosing as an alternative to plant 'safer' small species such as Prunus which may only have a 30-50 year lifespan. The luxuriantly tree lined urban rivers and major city roads may soon be a memory of the past and our cityscapes and quality of lives will be the poorer for that.

It was argued that unless planning authorities, architects, engineers, highways departments and landscape architects could all work together in partnership from the

As plants-people at heart we are always keen to extend the use of soft landscaping and quality planting design in all our schemes.

Flowering shrubs have been neglected by many designers over the last decade or so as the move toward perennial and prairie planting gathered momentum, arguably having peaked over the last couple of years.

We maintain that the most sustainable planting style is the mixed border which offers a range of habitat and nectar rich plants throughout the year and also avoids many of the Pest & Disease problems associate with monoculture planting.

Shrub borders in particular offer long-term planting solutions with little requirement for replacement plants or lifting and division of perennials and grasses every 3-5 years.

earliest stages of large projects, there would be few opportunities to plant 'big trees'. New tree pit technology allows trees to be planted in paved areas with a multitude of utility services running beneath, but these must be designed into schemes from the outset.

All is not gloom and doom however, and urban planner Anne Jaluzot, speaking on behalf of the <u>Trees and Design Action</u> <u>Group</u>, presented an inspirational overview of a major project in Lyon where a 7-lane urban freeway is being transformed into tree lined boulevards. Pedestrians, cyclists and motor vehicles all move freely and safely within dedicated spaces defined and separated by planting that provides aesthetic, environmental and social improvement.

At this time of year well-designed borders can spring back to life as later flowering shrubs take over from the often worn-out perennials that perform so well through May and June
